Coronavirus (Covid-19)

Availability of employees due to self isolation - vulnerable people.

Most people are at risk from infection (staff, children, visitors, etc.). The possible implications from contracting COVID 19 are, as we know, worse for vulnerable persons. The list of who is currently vulnerable includes: the elderly; those with chronic underlying health conditions; pregnant women. The majority of cases lead to mild symptoms (persistent coughing and temperature). The disease, however, can be fatal. Transmission is via person to person spread as airborne droplets and also via surfaces contaminated with virus.

Government Advice:

- Government guidance is being reviewed on a daily basis to ensure the latest available information is put into practice.
 - There is a flexible approach of home and office working for members of staff.
 - All offices have screens installed between desks.
 - Where contractors are to come to site to carry out statutory examinations, maintenance and repairs, this must be prearranged, contractors must confirm they are fit to work and not symptomatic
 - Where visitors (i.e. enforcement officers, auditors) attend the venue, they must confirm they are not symptomatic
 - Personal information should be held in accordance with Data Protection legislation.

Personal Hygiene:

 Staff have been advised by management regarding common control measures such as sneezing into a tissue or elbow and not just into hand, followed by immediate disposal of tissue and frequent hand washing.

Coronavirus (Covid-19) -Performing Arts

Most people are at risk from infection (staff, children, visitors, etc.). The possible implications from contracting COVID 19 are, as we know, worse for vulnerable persons. The list of who is currently vulnerable includes: the elderly: those with chronic underlying health conditions; pregnant women. The majority of cases lead to mild symptoms (persistent coughing and temperature). The disease, however, can be fatal. Transmission is via person to person spread as airborne droplets and also via surfaces contaminated with virus.

Operating Professionals and Amateur Performers

Professionals operating under the performing arts guidance must maintain social distancing in the performing arts environment wherever possible. If social distancing cannot be followed in relation to a professional activity, the organisation (B:MUSIC LTD) will consider whether this activity should continue. If the activities must continue then the following mitigation measures will be followed:

- Increasing the frequency of hand washing and surface cleaning.
- o Keeping the activity time involved as short as possible.
- Using back-to-back or side-to-side positioning (rather than face-to-face) whenever possible.

Personal Hygiene when working on clients sites:

- Managers to ensure adequate welfare facilities are available on sites.
- All workers have been informed to follow the Government's guidance on handwashing and ensure hands are washed on a regular basis.
- Reusable PPE will be thoroughly cleaned after use and not shared between workers
- Single use PPE will be disposed of so that it cannot be reused
- Workers are informed to clean and disinfect their equipment at the beginning and end of each shift / job.
- Staff and visiting personnel are to be encouraged to wear face coverings in all public areas of the premises where they could have contact with members of the public.
- Discourage staff from using other workers' phones, work tools and equipment, cups and drinking / eating vessels when possible. If necessary, clean and disinfect them before and after use.

Coronavirus (Covid-19) - Fire Safety		 Fire Safety: Stewards are trained in the Symphony Hall's evacuation procedures and are positioned at all fire doors during performances. Duty Managers or Stewards undertake visual fire safety checks before opening. Hand sanitiser will be provided on the main fire exit doors and / or at fire assembly points and employees encouraged to use hand sanitiser when re-entering the building. Usual in house testing of the fire alarm / emergency lighting will continue. Fire doors will not be propped open, even as a measure to minimise surface contact. Door handles and touch points will be cleaned on a daily basis.
